

LENGTH OF MANUSCRIPTS

The average size of our journals continues to increase. To counter this trend, referees are requested to pay particular attention to the length of each manuscript in relation to its content and, if excessive, to make **specific recommendations for reduction**. The intent is not to make papers so concise that they are incomprehensible to all but the most knowledgeable expert, but rather to force authors to make a tight, well-balanced presentation of their work. We do not want the very size of the journals to become a deterrent to widespread communication of one's work to others.

Authors are strongly urged to present for publication only that material necessary to the purpose of the work. Also, publication of ongoing work in a series of papers must be avoided in favor of single, comprehensive papers. Recommendations for **condensation** made by referees or the editor should be seriously considered. Supplementary material, such as raw data, additional supporting results, or the details of theoretical derivations, which would be helpful mainly to interested specialists, should be made available directly from the authors or from document depositories such as Electronic Physics Auxiliary Publication Service (EPAPS) of the American Institute of Physics.
